## **REACH WIDE:** Ideas for Engagement

Create your own adventure scenario, just as Cara's friends did: Imagine that someone in your family goes on a mission trip, and those left behind send him or her out by meeting their needs and covering their responsibilities while they're gone.

- Who is the person? Where is he or she going, and for how long?
- What are the person's responsibilities at home, and who will fill in for each one while he or she is away?
- What methods of communication will you put into place?

Set aside time to talk about how you might deal with the imaginary circumstances. Pray for someone you know who is actually living out this example of senders and being sent.

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## BE CLOSE: Living "Sent"



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### **BLESS A BUSINESS**

Pray with your children, asking God for the names of two (or more) businesses in your community that he is sending you to bless this month. Fill a mug with individually wrapped candies for each business. Wrap the mug with clear cellophane and ribbon. Visit the business with your children, thanking the owner and employees for what they do for the community. Learn the names of anyone you meet. Ask what you can pray about for them, and continue to pray for them as you pass their business. Stop in regularly to keep the relationship building by continuing the conversation.

- How does it help your community to have many different businesses?
- What problems do you see that business owners face?
- Ask God how often he will send you to bless another business.





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### **PIONEER IN PRAYER**

Explore a new area of town that you know very little about. Walk together with your kids.

- What do you notice that catches your attention?
- How do you see God at work in this part of town?
- Who do you see that God has sent to serve this part of town?

• How would you pray for the people in this area of town? Pray conversationally as you walk, eyes open. Remember to greet people, and engage them in conversation. As you drive home, continue the conversation, and share what you learned about this new area in your town.





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## LOVE DIFFERENTLY: Living "Sent"

### **NEW DISH, NEW FRIEND**

Discover someone in your community — an individual or owner of an ethnic shop — who is culturally diverse from you. Ask them for the recipe or tips on how to make a certain food from their country. (Don't forget to learn their names!) Involve your kids as you make the recipe. Challenge everyone to be open to finding the positive about new recipes. Write a thank-you note with your kids and go back to share with the person how your recipe turned out.

- What did you like about this new recipe?
- If God sent you to another country, what sort of food would you want to share with the people there?
- How do you think people feel when they come to your country and need to adjust to new types of food?






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
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### SIGN LANGUAGE

Simple sign language helps you communicate even when our spoken words aren't effective. That includes people who are deaf or struggle with speaking language in the way you do. A popular way people communicate when they don't speak the same language is to create gestures. Learn 5 common ways to communicate by sign language — *hello, yes, no, eat, drink, more,* and *thank you*. You can teach these gestures to very young children who can't speak, or use them with anyone you have difficulty in communicating with. Ask God to send you to someone, so you can use your new language this month. Maybe they can teach you a new word.





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
