Dad reported that he had an appointment with the agency representative to find out Max's family's immigration status and whether they could help in these matters.

Mom's plan was to pick Cara up after school, and the two would visit Max's sister...with a welcome basket of home baked treats.

Cara would alert her 'study buddies' and they begin collecting toys and children's books. As they got better acquainted, Cara would volunteer to babysit after school to give Max's sister time for herself. Jeremy offered to help out, too, once he and Max were out of detention.

Jeremy asked for prayer that he could find a New Testament version to give to Max for them to read together.

The family ended with a time of prayer. They were excited about what lay ahead, trusting that their efforts, as they listened closely for God's guidance, would go well.

SOUP FOR SENIORS

Every Saturday, make and deliver this soup to senior citizens in your community. Allow for a time for conversation and prayer each week, if possible.

Chicken Noodle Soup in a Jar - Ingredients:

2 tbsp. dried onion flakes, 3 tablespoons chicken bouillon granules, 1 tsp. dried parsley, 1 tsp. dried celery flakes, 1 or 2 tsp. dried carrots, 3 cups medium egg noodles. In a quart jar, layer from bottom in the order listed above, then seal the jar. Cut a circle of material to decorate the lid if possible. Tie a ribbon around the top to attach the cooking instructions on it. Include a 10 oz. can of chicken separately.

Write these instructions on your gift tag:

How to make Chicken Noodle Soup: Bring 16 cups of water to boil in a large saucepan. Add the contents of the jar of soup mix. Stir. Cover, reduce heat and simmer for 25 minutes. Add one 10 oz. can of cooked chicken. Simmer for five minutes until vegetables are tender and chicken is heated through. Enjoy!
